Community Engagement to Date




- Over 6,000 people participated in Phase I visioning

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
Major Takeaways: Community Visioning



GP 1: RESILIENT LOCAL & REGIONAL ECONOMY



- 1.1: Build strong partnerships and encourage <u>local and regional collaboration</u> on economic development initiatives.
- 1.2: Promote a diverse and stable economic base.
- 1.3: Support continued growth of Reno's technology and knowledge-based sectors.
- 1.4: Support the growth, creation, and retention of <u>local businesses and start-ups</u>.
- 1.5: Support the development of a <u>diverse</u>, <u>educated</u>, <u>and adaptable workforce</u>.






HOW WILL THE POLICIES HELP PROMOTE A MORE RESILIENT ECONOMY?



- Provide a framework for local decision-making on economic development issues
- Foster continued collaboration with state and regional partners on initiatives that support the city's goals
- Support local businesses and start-ups
- Emphasize the importance of quality of life considerations



GP 2: RESPONSIBLE & WELL-MANAGED GROWTH




- 2.1: Support a <u>fiscally-responsible growth</u> pattern and annexation policy to <u>maintain and improve existing levels of service</u> for current residents and future generations.
- 2.2: Encourage infill and redevelopment.
- 2.3: Ensure <u>effective</u>, <u>efficient</u>, <u>and equitable</u> delivery of <u>city services and infrastructure</u>.
- 2.4: <u>Collaborate</u> with regional entities and service providers on growth and infrastructure issues.
- 2.5: Promote the use of <u>sustainable development</u> practices.





HOW WILL THE POLICIES PROMOTE RESPONSIBLE & WELL-MANAGED GROWTH?


- Clarify parameters for future growth within the Sphere of Influence
- Establish priority areas for growth—generally, as well as for infill and redevelopment
- Encourage greater housing options in large developments
- Facilitate collaboration with partners in the region
- Encourage sustainable development practices



GP 3: THRIVING DOWNTOWN & UNIVERSITY DISTRICT



- 3.1: Cultivate a <u>vibrant and livable</u> downtown environment that <u>balances the needs of residents</u> and <u>visitors</u>.
- 3.2: Enhance public safety and create inviting streets and public spaces for people.
- 3.3: Promote the <u>continued revitalization</u> of the downtown economy and built environment.
- 3.4: <u>Strengthen multimodal connections</u> to and within downtown Reno.





HOW WILL THE POLICIES PROMOTE A THRIVING DOWNTOWN & UNIVERSITY DISTRICT?



- Support core values defined as part Downtown Action Plan
 - Prosperous
 - Connected
 - Livable
 - Safe & Clean
 - Vibrant
- Policies and design principles reinforce district-level distinctions within downtown



GP 4: VIBRANT NEIGHBORHOODS

& CENTERS



- 4.1: Encourage a <u>diverse mix of housing options</u> to meet the needs of existing and future residents of all ages, abilities, and income levels.
- 4.2: Promote the development of new neighborhoods that offer a <u>range of lifestyle options and amenities</u> that meet the short- and long-term needs of the community.
- 4.3: Support <u>continued investment</u> in and <u>ongoing</u> <u>maintenance</u> of infrastructure and amenities in established neighborhoods.
- 4.4: Encourage the creation of <u>walkable community/</u> <u>neighborhood centers</u> that provide a variety of services and amenities.
- 4.5: Encourage <u>pedestrian and bicycle connections</u> and <u>greenways</u> as part of new development and integrate into established neighborhoods.






HOW WILL THE POLICIES PROMOTE VIBRANT NEIGHBORHOODS AND CENTERS?



- Promote housing diversity/affordability
- Promote ongoing maintenance and reinvestment in established neighborhoods
- Improve access for pedestrians and bicycles
- Reinforce concepts included in the Structure Plan and Design Principles
 - Neighborhood Centers
 - Enhanced walkability in both new and existing neighborhoods



GP 5: WELL-CONNECTED CITY & REGION



- 5.1: Continue to develop a <u>balanced</u>, <u>well-connected</u> <u>bicycle and pedestrian network</u> that enhances mobility for all modes.
- 5.2: Actively manage transportation systems and infrastructure to improve <u>reliability</u>, <u>efficiency</u>, <u>and safety</u>.
- 5.3: <u>Facilitate the movement of goods and services</u> throughout the region via truck, air, and rail.
- 5.4: Encourage the use of transit, car or van pools, bicycling, walking, and other forms of <u>alternative</u> <u>transportation</u>.
- 5.5: Anticipate and plan for the implications and opportunities associated with <u>connected vehicles</u>, <u>autonomous vehicles</u>, and the expected transition from personal car ownership to <u>mobility-as-a-service</u>.






HOW WILL THE POLICIES ADVANCE A WELL-CONNECTED CITY AND REGION?



- Consider and balance needs of all modes
- Reinforce city's role in transportation planning and establish clear links to the RTP and RTC programs:
 - RTP and RTIP
 - Bicycle & Pedestrian Plan
 - Complete Streets Master Plan
- Support a robust public transportation system
- Manage traffic operations and transportation demand
- Encourage alternative transportation options with trip-reduction programs, supportive development, first and last mile connections, and bikeways and supportive facilities





GP 6: SAFE, HEALTHY, AND INCLUSIVE COMMUNITY



- 6.1: Continue to provide <u>high-quality community safety and</u> <u>emergency response services</u>.
- 6.2: Minimize risks to lives, property, and infrastructure due to natural disasters and other natural or man-made hazards.
- 6.3: Support <u>active lifestyles</u> among residents of all ages.
- 6.4: Encourage <u>health and wellness</u> through <u>education and prevention</u>.
- 6.5: Increase the availability of and access to <u>fresh and local</u> <u>food</u>.
- 6.6: Foster a <u>culture of inclusivity</u>—embracing and respecting the diversity of Reno's residents.
- 6.7: Advocate for a strong and <u>successful education system</u>, <u>workforce training</u>, and <u>lifelong learning opportunities</u>.





HOW WILL THE POLICIES FOSTER A SAFER, HEALTHIER, AND MORE INCLUSIVE COMMUNITY?



- Reinforce the relationships between safety, access to services/equity, education, and food access
- Carry forward foundation of collaboration for human service provision
- Strengthen existing policies and address gaps:
 - Local food access
 - Hazard mitigation and risk reduction
 - Active living opportunities
 - Diversity and inclusivity





GP 7: QUALITY PLACES & OUTDOOR RECREATION OPPORTUNITIES



- 7.1: <u>Conserve and protect</u> Reno's natural resources and environment.
- 7.2: Establish an <u>interconnected network of open spaces</u> and greenways.
- 7.3: Maintain <u>access to public lands</u> at the urban/rural interface.
- 7.4: Increase Reno's profile as a <u>center of arts and culture</u>.
- 7.5: Protect and preserve Reno's <u>heritage and historic</u> assets.
- 7.6: <u>Improve quality of the public realm</u> (e.g. parks, public spaces, streets) through context-sensitive design, targeted investment, and regular maintenance.
- 7.7: Increase tree canopy and green spaces within the City.





HOW WILL THE POLICIES SUPPORT QUALITY PLACES & OUTDOOR ACTIVITIES?



- Protect and enhance community amenities, public spaces, and recreational opportunities that contribute to quality of life and economic vitality
- Move towards a more access-based approach for parks and recreational opportunities
- Reinforce input received during Phase I outreach regarding:
 - Access to the outdoors
 - High quality public places
 - Maintaining City's sense of place
 - Diverse natural and historic resources
 - Expanding the role of arts and culture





GP 8: EFFECTIVE GOVERNMENT



- 8.1: Align day-to-day decision-making with the implementation of the Master Plan.
- 8.2: Enhance teamwork, cooperation, and problem-solving within the City organization.
- 8.3: Develop and support <u>leadership that reflects the diversity of the community.</u>
- 8.4: Inform, educate, and involve citizens.
- 8.5: Explore opportunities to <u>increase the efficiency</u> of City facilities.
- 8.6: <u>Collaborate</u> with local and regional partners on issues of mutual significance.





HOW WILL THE POLICIES ENCOURAGE EFFECTIVE GOVERNMENT?




- Encourage broader and consistent use of the Master Plan as a decision-making tool
- Foster accountability to the goals that emerged from extensive Phase I community engagement
- Build on community engagement policies in current Master Plan (Policy Plan) and council strategic plan priorities






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HISTORIC RESOURCES



Policy 7.5a: Composition, Powers, and Duties of the HRC



Clarify the Historic Resources Commission's role as advisor to the City Council on matters relating to history, historic preservation, and planning.

- Maintain Certified Local Government status for purposes of securing funds
- Modify HRC composition to include other professionals and the public
- Update and clarify the Powers and Duties of the HRC to assist in reconfirmation of purpose
- Reinstate HRC's annual budget & provide increases staff tie to historic preservation program
- Monitor best practices that support historic preservation
- Foster a community commitment to historic preservation



Policy 7.5B: Identification of Historic Properties



Identify, recognize, and increase historic resources by encouraging and incentivizing the addition of properties to the City, State, and National Registers.

- -Encourage the inclusion of historic resources on the city, State, and National Registers of Historic Places and the formation of historic districts and/or conservation districts.
- Develop a mechanism to identify and rank historicage properties in a non-regulatory list to provide enhanced resources to property owners, developers, architects, and City staff, and to assist the Historic Resources Commission and City staff in pursuing the addition of properties to the City Register.
- -Establish and follow a program and schedule to update the survey and inventory of the city's historic resources.



Policy 7.5B: Identification of Historic Properties (cont.)



Identify, recognize, and increase historic resources by encouraging and incentivizing the addition of properties to the City, State, and National Registers.

- Prepare a broad historical context to assist with the evaluation of and appreciation for Reno's historic resources.
- Develop a program to apply for annual Historic
 Preservation Fund grant funding through the State Historic
 Preservation Office to update and continue the survey and inventory program.
- Revise and simplify the City Register designation process, clarify the eligibility criteria, and include historical integrity as a consideration.
- Develop incentives to add properties to the City Register.
- -Actively pursue new listings to the City Register through outreach to owners of potentially eligible properties and properties listed in the National Register of Historic Places.



Policy 7.5c: Protection of Historic Resources



Reinforce the regulatory processes of the HRC and its role as historic preservation advisor to the City Council.

- Develop process to evaluate impact of development projects on historic resources
- Develop mitigation measures to lessen the impact of the loss or alteration of an historic resource
- Protect City-owned historic resources
- Develop design guidelines for the COA process
- Develop an administrative COA process to streamline the review of minor exterior modifications

- Develop a demolition by neglect provision
- Integrate the goals of HRC with broader Adaptive Reuse policy
- Promote the Federal Rehabilitation Tax program through the SHPO for eligible commercial properties
- Develop incentives for City
 Register properties that assist
 property owners in protection of
 historic character and developers
 in redevelopment of historic
 properties

Policy 7.5d: Education



Provide educational resources on historic preservation, the City Register of Historic Places, and methods for preserving historic structures.

- Provide training to HRC members
- Create public-facing GIS map or surveyed properties
- Redesign the historic preservation section of the City's website
- Make available educational materials
- Expand annual award program
- Develop a preservation toolkit



POLICY 7.5E: ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT AND HERITAGE PRESERVATION



Emphasize the economic benefits of historic preservation and its role in economic development, sustainability, and heritage tourism.

- Encourage outreach to private developers to promote and facilitate investment in historic rehabilitation
- Identify historically important buildings in need of rehabilitation
- Develop a historic marker program
- Establish heritage partnerships and networks with local, state, and national historic preservation and tourism organizations
