CoC Overview

A Continuum of Care (CoC) is a regional planning body that coordinates housing and services for homeless families and individuals. CoCs were created by HUD to streamline the funding and annual application process for housing and supportive services, and encourage coordination of housing service providers on a local level. 1.9 million was allocated during the 2019-2020 funding cycle.

CoCs are responsible for;

- Annual application to HUD for funding (NOFA)
- Annual Point in Time Count
- Maintain system wide data in HMIS
- Gather a governing board, and subcommittees
- Ensure the region is in compliance with HUD regulations
- Maintain a Coordinated Entry System



Strategic Plan

The new CoC Strategic Plan was adopted in October, 2020

Since our last Strategic Plan the CoC has seen significant changes including;

- Lead entity changed from a private consultant to the City of Reno
- Org Code Report
- Significant changes in our housing market
- COVID-19
- Built for Zero

Point In Time Count

The Point In Time Count (PIT) is an annual count on a single night in January of the sheltered, and unsheltered homeless population in the region. All CoCs around the country conduct PIT Counts within the last 10 days of January, and submit their findings to HUD. The PIT is the only time during the year when our unsheltered population is comprehensively counted and interviewed.

The PIT consists of

- Unsheltered Count
- Sheltered Count
- Housing Inventory Count




PIT 2021 - January 28, 2021

- All volunteers will be wearing PPE and will hand out PPE
- Headcount only no surveys conducted this year

Interviews will be handed out a week in advance at the shelter locations, and by outreach workers

Sheltered and Housing Inventory counts will be pulled from HMIS
