**SUBJECT:** 2023 Point-In-Time Count Results

The 2023 Point-In-Time (PIT) Count was held on Thursday, January 26, 2023. Conducted annually, the PIT count is a measurement of sheltered individuals experiencing homelessness on a single night in the region.

#### 2023 PIT Count Summary

- Overall total number of individuals experiencing homelessness: 1,690
  - o 5% increase from 1605 in 2022
- Total number of unsheltered individuals (living in tent, vehicle, along the river, etc.): 329
  - 21% decrease from 417 in 2022
- Total number of individuals in an emergency shelter or transitional housing: 1361
  - o 14.5% increase from 1.188 in 2022

#### **Key Highlights**

- The overall increase to 1,690 is attributed to the addition of countywide programs
  reporting into the Homeless Management Information System (HMIS). Clean and Safe
  and City partners (Reno Initiative for Shelter and Equality, Karma Box Project, and
  Downtown Reno Partnership) utilize HMIS. The Community Court program is in the
  process of establishing access.
- Coordination amongst outreach staff and community outreach providers to help transition individuals into an emergency shelter or housing arrangement continues to improve.

As highlighted in the table below, 2023 marks two consecutive years in a decrease of unsheltered individuals in the region. Outreach to unsheltered individuals remains a priority for the Clean and Safe program and contracted outreach partners.

# Methodology Summary



- Conducted annually as required by the US Department of Housing and Urban Development
- Must be conducted during the last 10 days in January unless a waiver is granted
  - Statewide, the PIT count was conducted on 1/26/23
- Unsheltered data is counted via an in-person count across the community
  - Starts at 4 am, completed by 9 am
  - Countywide coverage
- Sheltered data is gathered through HMIS and agency submissions







# Result-Total (Sheltered +Unsheltered)

- 1,690 total person counted
- ❖Increase of 85 individuals compared to 2022 PIT Count
  - Decrease of 88 individuals in the unsheltered population
  - Increase of 173 individuals in shelters and transitional housing.



## Result--Unsheltered



- ❖329 counted
  - \*238 male (72%)
  - \*80 female (24%)
  - ❖11 Gender that is not singularly 'Female' or 'Male' (e.g., non-binary, genderfluid, agender, culturally specific gender) (3%)
  - \*8 between the ages of 18 and 24
  - 15 Veterans
  - \*68 Chronically Homeless
- 173 individuals decrease compared to 2022 PIT Count



## Result--Sheltered



- 1,361 sheltered (Emergency shelter + transitional housing)
  - ❖173 individual increase from 2022
  - \*885 Male (65%), 466 Female (34%), 10 Gender that is not singularly 'Female' or 'Male' (e.g., non-binary, genderfluid, agender, culturally specific gender); Transgender; and Questioning (1%)
- 1,106 in emergency shelter
  - 111 individual increase from 2022
- 255 in transitional housing
  - 62 individual increase from 2022



# Result-Motel Count



- 2,132 persons in weekly motels
  - \*170 individuals less then 2022
- ❖968 long term residents (12+ months in unit)
  - ❖311 fewer individuals then 2022
- \*714 seniors living in weekly motels
  - ❖52 fewer individual then 2022
- ❖76 children
  - ❖30 fewer children then 2022



# Conclusions



- The unsheltered count decreased by 88 individuals from last year.
- The sheltered count is 173 individuals higher than last year.
- The number of sheltered beds available in the community has increased
  - Men's and Women's CrossRoads were added as emergency shelter beds in 2022
- Utilization of transitional housing has improved
